he doth absolutely renounce, and abjure, all allegiance and fidelity to any foreign
prince, potentate, state or sovereignty whatever, particularly to the *King of*
Great Britain & Ireland to whom he was
heretofore a subject, that he never hath borne any hereditary title, nor hath been of
any of the orders of nobility in the Kingdom from which he came, and is ready to
declare on oath, the truth of these things, and prays to be admitted, a Citizen of the
United States, and of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.
