HUMBLY SHEWETH, That your petitioner

is a native of Ireland and was heretofore a
subject of the Queen of Great Britain Ireland and

Empire of India that he has resided within the limits and under the jurisdic-
tion of the United States of America five years, and within the State of Pennsylvania
one year; and that he has ~~heretofore~~ prior to this application, declared his intention
of becoming a citizen of the United States in a manner required by law, as in and by
the certificate hereunto attached appears; that he will support the Constitution of
the United States, and that he doth absolutely and entirely renounce and forever ab-
jure all allegiance and fidelity to any foreign Prince, Potentate and Sovereignty
whatever, and particularly to the said Queen of Great Britain Ireland
and Empire of India whereof he was heretofore

a subject. Your petitioner therefore prays that he may be admitted to become a cit-
izen of the United States of America.

petition are true, and that I will support the Constitution of the United States; and that I do absolutely and entirely
renounce and abjure forever, all allegiance and fidelity to any foreign prince, potentate or sovereignty whatever, and
particularly do absolutely and entirely renounce and abjure forever all allegiance and fidelity to the Queen of
Great Britain Ireland &c of which I was heretofore a subject.
