

To the Honorable JOHN BREDIN, President, and ^{THOMAS HENRY} HENRY and BENJAMIN ADAMS, Esqs. Associate Judges of the Court of Common Pleas, now sitting for Beaver County:

The Petition of *William Seaf* of the County of Beaver, humbly sheweth: THAT your Petitioner, *filed a declaration of his intention to become a citizen of the United States on the 6th March 1838 and has resided*

within the State of Pennsylvania, at least three years, that he will support the Constitution of the United States, and that he doth absolutely renounce and abjure, all allegiance and fidelity to any foreign prince, potentate, state or sovereignty whatever, particularly to the King of Great Britain to whom he was heretofore a subject, that he hath never borne any hereditary title, nor hath been of any of the orders of nobility in the Kingdom from which he came, and is ready to declare on oath the truth of these things, and prays to be admitted a Citizen of the United States, and of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.
