THE PETITION OF *Robert McKenna* of the County of Beaver humbly sheweth; That your Petitioner, *Arrived in the United States in the Year One thousand Eight Hundred and Twenty four - since has resided -*

within the State of Pennsylvania, at least (five) years, that he will support the Constitution of the United States, and that he doth absolutely renounce and abjure, all allegiance and fidelity to any foreign Prince, Potentate, State or Sovereignty whatever, particularly to the *Queen of England* to whom he was heretofore a subject, that he hath never borne any of the orders of nobility in the Kingdom from which he came, and is ready to declare on oath the truth of these things, and prays to be admitted a Citizen of the United States, and of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania,
