

To the Honorable the Judges of the Court of Common Pleas in and for the County of Beaver.

The Petition of *David Morgan* of the County of Beaver,

Humbly Sheweth, That your petitioner *arrived in the United States in the year 1832, and has continued to reside*

within the State of Pennsylvania at least five years; that he will support the Constitution of the United States; and that he doth absolutely renounce and abjure all allegiance and fidelity to any foreign Prince, Potentate, State or Sovereignty whatever, particularly to the *Queen of England* — to whom he was heretofore a subject; that he hath never borne any of the orders of nobility in the Kingdom from which he came, and is ready to declare on oath the truth of these things, and prays to be admitted a Citizen of the United States, and of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.
