

To the Honorable JOHN BREDIN, President, and THOMAS HENRY and BENJAMIN ADAMS,  
Esqs. Associate Judges of the Court of Common Pleas, now sitting for Beaver County:

The Petition of *Robert Watt* of the County of Beaver,  
humbly sheweth: THAT your Petitioner, *has resided within*  
*under the Jurisdiction of the United States at*  
*least five years* and within the State of Pennsylvania, at  
least three years, that he will support the Constitution of the United States, and that he  
doth absolutely renounce and abjure, all allegiance and fidelity to any foreign prince, po-  
tentate, state or sovereignty whatever, particularly to the *King of*  
*Great Britain* to whom he was heretofore a subject, that  
he hath never borne any hereditary title, nor hath been of any of the orders of nobility in  
the Kingdom from which he came, and is ready to declare on oath the truth of these  
things, and prays to be admitted a Citizen of the United States, and of the Commonwealth  
of Pennsylvania.

the same.
