

TO the Honourable *Charles Shaler* Esquire, President, and
J H Reddick & D Dummer

Associates, Judges, of the Court of Common Pleas, now sitting for Beaver County: The Petition of *F. Boger* of the County of Beaver, humbly sheweth, That your Petitioner, *has resided within the limits of the United States since the year 1817 and* within the State of Pennsylvania, at least three years, that he will support the Constitution of the United States, and that he doth absolutely renounce, and abjure, all allegiance and fidelity to any foreign prince, potentate, state or sovereignty whatever, particularly to the *King of Wurtemberg* to whom he was heretofore a subject, that he never hath borne any hereditary title, nor hath been of any of the orders of nobility in the Kingdom from which he came, and is ready to declare on oath the truth of these things, and prays to be admitted a Citizen of the United States, and of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

Boger* and being sworn according to law, saith that what he hath set forth in the above petition is the truth, and that he doth renounce and abjure all allegiance and fidelity to any foreign prince, potentate or sovereignty whatever, and particularly to the *King of Wurtemberg* and that he will support the Constitution of the United States.
